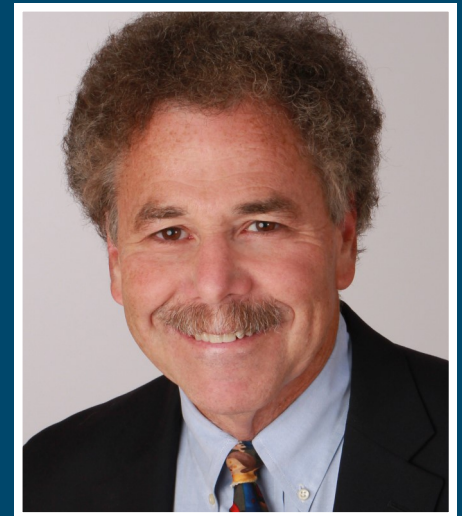

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Special Education and The Science of Reading: It's About Gen Ed First!

This session will illuminate fundamental understandings about The Science of Reading and how they relate to both general and special education. - The significance of having a normed oral reading fluency (ORF) measure for universal screening and progress monitoring, and its relationship to reading comprehension
- The what, why and how of diagnostic assessments that inform instruction in the foundational skills necessary for achieving oral reading fluency and reading comprehension

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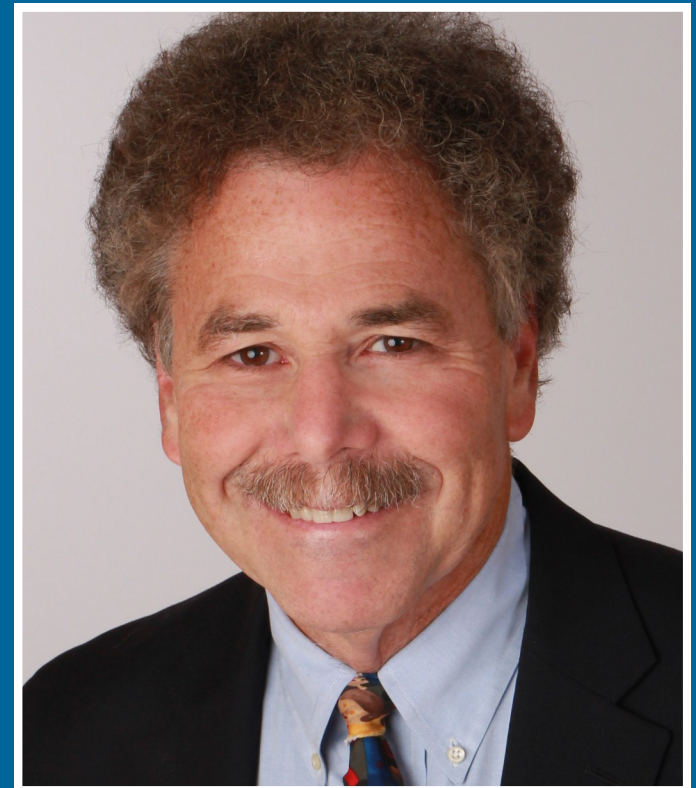
